## Message from the President

Happy 2003! I hope this winter newsletter finds you in good health and ready to face the New Year with excitement and anticipation.

Several key issues from the fall are continuing to affect our neighborhood. We were saddened to learn of the demise of the Mt. Washington School's plans to become a PreK-8<sup>th</sup> grade school. Due to the financial crisis at both the city and state levels, the school's proposal was denied. The silver lining in this cloud is that now Mt. Washington fifth graders will be zoned for Roland Park Middle School. One of the top middle schools in the city, Roland Park offers an exceptional educational program for our children. We applaud Principal Lisa Harvin, her staff, and members of the School Improvement Team, Josh Neiman, George Lewis, Eva Glasgow, and everyone else involved for their devotion and dedication to our students.

At this time we have not heard of any offers to purchase the St. Paul Co. campus. Their property has been divided into two parcels, which are being marketed separately. The north side, all county land, encompasses the Life Building, which is currently being leased to Piper Marbury, Ruddick & Wolfe. The south campus currently houses the St. Paul Co. offices and lies in both the city and county. The St. Paul would very much like to stay in our neighborhood and is searching for a buyer who would then lease space back to them.

Beazer Homes, the developer of the Bonnie View Golf Course, has submitted their plans to Baltimore County. They have requested rezoning for an active adult, gated community consisting of 574 units. This would include single-family homes, town homes as well as four-story condominiums. A second plan, the contrast plan, was also submitted to the county. The contrast plan does not require rezoning and allows for 367 single-family units. A joint task force composed of representatives from the five communities surrounding the development has engaged legal representation in working with the developer, the county and city planners. We are striving to limit the impact this development will have on our community.

The future of Pimlico Race Track is of great concern to the community. We are setting up a community-wide meeting with representatives from Magna Entertainment and the Maryland Jockey Club for February 18, 2003 at the Wesley. The board is forming a Pimlico Task Force committee. Please contact me if you are interested in serving on this committee.

On the lighter side, take some time to walk through our beautiful neighborhood, even on a cold winter day. A stroll through the Arboretum, down through the village, and under the expressway is not only invigorating but rewarding with a cup of coffee or hot chocolate at the end. Be sure to stop by and welcome Martin and Sunny Lee, new owners of the Mt. Washington Market and Deli.

I look forward to seeing many of you at the community meeting, February 18, 2003, 7:30 PM at The Wesley, 2211 W. Rogers Ave. Happy New Year!

## ◆ Attention Pimlico Race Track Neighbors ◆

It is time again for households neighboring Pimlico Race Track to apply for a Residential Parking Permit.

MWIA Area Captains will distribute flyers with specific information to your home. If you have not received a flyer, contact your Area Captain (Area 1 - Maggie Kunz, 410-664-9466; Area 2 - Chelsea Steiner, 410-466-1577) or Taliya Adelstein, 410-367-4539.

Racing at Pimlico will run April 3rd through June 8th and from September 3rd through October 4th, 2003. You must have your new parking permits affixed to your vehicle(s) in accordance with the City's posting by March 25th or risk a \$52.00 traffic ticket, plus a \$25.00 tow and impound charge. Parking permit applications will not be distributed to each household.

Only bona fide residents of the Plan Area are entitled to apply for permits. Each household (regardless of the number of vehicles in the household) is entitled to two weekday visitor passes and six weekend visitor passes. An application must be filled out to receive the weekend visitor passes only. The weekend visitor passes may not be used in lieu of a regular sticker for vehicles which are normally parked on the street by the household.

Households with vehicles bearing out-of-state tags (e.g. students and military personnel) must submit with the application a signed affidavit from the owner of the property certifying the applicant is a bona fide resident at the address within the parking permit boundaries. Proof of military or student status is necessary.

Persons operating cars not registered to them, such as LEASED CARS or EMPLOYER OWNED CARS, must provide documenta-

tion: a lease agreement or an affidavit stating an individual is leasing the car; an affidavit signed by the business or enterprise certifying the vehicle is assigned to the individual applying for a permit.

You will need your registration(s), driver's license and/or lease agreement, affidavit, etc. The fee for parking permits is \$10.00 per permit, payable at time of application. Payment may be by personal check or money order payable to Director of Finance. Cash will not be accepted!

Permits may be picked up at the Elderslie-St. Andrew's Methodist church 5601 Pimlico Rd, on Saturday, February 1, from 10:00 A.M. to 1:00 P.M. and on Monday, February 3rd from 7:00 P.M. to 8:30 P.M.

Remember to bring your yellow receipt with you to pick up your parking permits and visitor passes.

### ***Council Districts to Change***

Baltimore City's council districts will be undergoing radical change this spring. The mayor will propose a new map of 14 single-member council districts to the City Council by February 1, and the Council has 60 days to approve the plan or pass an alternative plan. These districts are supposed to represent equally populated areas for council representation throughout the city. The challenge will be to divide the city into new districts and to maintain neighborhoods in the process.

According to the Baltimore City Council website ([www.baltimorecitycouncil.com](http://www.baltimorecitycouncil.com)), residents are encouraged to participate in the process by keeping abreast of the activities of the Redistricting Committee of the Baltimore City Council and to attend the yet-to-be announced public hearings. The dates, times and locations of these hearings will be posted in local newspapers and on the City Council's website in the first two weeks of January.

Councilwoman Rikki Spector (410-396-4819) is the 5th District's representative on the Redistricting Committee and Stephanie Rawlings Blake (410-396-4832) is one of the co-chairs.

The MWIA website ([www.mwia.org](http://www.mwia.org)) will post hearing dates, time, and places as soon as they are made public.

## Bonnie View Country Club Redevelopment Update:

George Rathlev, of Beazer Homes, the hopeful developer of the Bonnie View Country Club, met with the MWIA board in December. Mr. Rathlev has been meeting with various community groups to encourage community input on the development plans for Beazer Homes at Bonnie View Golf Course.

The company currently has two plans:

- A mixed use housing plan of 574 units - some detached houses, others are townhouses and condominiums.
- The contrast plan calls for 367 units - mostly single detached houses.

Both plans involve a single gated entry near the current entrance to the country club.

Several individuals asked about the impact this development would have on Smith Avenue traffic. Mr. Rathlev responded that The Traffic Group of Towson conducted a study, and they reported the proposed traffic impact "does not exceed requirements for adequate facilities." While he deferred making specific comments about the traffic report, he said a copy of the study will be available before Christmas.

The housing development plan has been presented to the County, but has not been officially presented to the City. Both the County and City need to approve the plan before development can proceed.

### **Snow Removal**

It is the duty of all homeowners or occupants to remove snow and clear the pedestrian footpaths within 3 hours after a snowfall. If the snowfall ends at night, it must be cleared by 11 a.m., and then the sidewalks and gutters must be kept free of snow and ice. Source: Baltimore City Code, Art. 19, Sec. 177.



# BUDGET CUTS END PRE-K - 8 INITIATIVE

Students and families recently learned their hard work to create the new Mount Washington pre-kindergarten - eighth grade school has been scotched due to budget cuts on the city and state levels. Students currently enrolled in the nascent Mt. Washington 6<sup>th</sup> grade as well as this year's fifth graders have been newly re-zoned to Roland Park Middle School, effective in the 2003-04 academic year.

Several school system representatives updated parents, community members, and the MWIA board at its December meeting. *Lisa Harvin*, Principal of Mt. Washington School, explained that city-wide budget cuts eliminated any financial capability to support the planned expansion and development of a community school. Consequently, Mt. Washington will revert to a K - 5 school in the 2003 - 04 academic year.

*Tom Seiler*, from the administration offices, provided more details about the changes. Twenty four jurisdictions annually request the State legislature for money to help with capital improvements to school buildings. Expansion funds for the Mt. Washington School were to supplement money committed by the city. However, the 23 counties and Baltimore City will have access to only half the earlier projected amount of cash, and Baltimore City traditionally ranks low in capital improvement priorities. An interagency committee on public school construction has determined Baltimore City would get funding for only two of the 58 projects for which it had asked. A total of \$6.5 million was granted for improvements to Lakeland School and Southern High School.

Planning Department director of the Department of Planning *Ken Johnson*, reported on the new zoned middle school for Mt. Washington. Fallstaff Middle school is in the process of closing and will reopen and as a K - 5 school. Carmen Russo has zoned the Mt. Washington students to Roland Park. Roland Park is currently at capacity, but the administration is planning on some of the overcrowding being eased with the soon to be expanded Waverly pre-K - 8 school, resulting in a decrease of Waverly students at Roland Park. There will be a public forum on the issues for Roland Park, Mt. Washington, and Waverly students sometime in late January or early February. Interested people should check the MWIA website for times and dates.

Roland Park's principal, *Mariall Hardiman*, welcomed Mt.

Washington families to Roland Park. She described the variety of programs Roland Park operates: - the Ingenuity Project with math-science emphasis, advanced academic, and traditional middle school. Students who are currently enrolled in Mt. Washington's 6<sup>th</sup> grade, both advanced academic and traditional academic, will be welcomed to their respective programs in Roland Park's seventh grade next year. Students who may want to apply for the Ingenuity program are encouraged to do so. The Roland Park Program is full, but there are some openings at Robert Poole Middle School. To encourage 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders to apply, *Carol Costa*, director of the Ingenuity Program, announced the December 16<sup>th</sup> deadline has been extended until January 16, for Mt. Washington students.

Ms. Hardiman also touted Roland Park's National Academic League team, one of the best in the country, a band and orchestra, entering in a partnership with Baltimore Concert Artists, a writing center with writing interns from Johns Hopkins University (RP students had a 90% pass rate on the CTBS tests) They also have a basketball team, baseball team and lacrosse and soccer teams. For students who are not athletically inclined, there is the Advocates for the Arts, a parent group. Also chess and ecology clubs.

Carol Costa, the director of Ingenuity, had applications.

The update was concluded by *Josh Nieman*, a Mt. Washington parent active on the K-8 planning for more than two years. Mr. Nieman said the group will seek funding for improvements to the existing school and continue to keep Mt. Washington School attractive to area families.

# ...BUT NOT THE DREAM

*Editor's Note:* Parent leaders at The Mt. Washington School were disappointed with the loss of funding for the K-8 initiative but see this as an opportunity to provide Mt. Washington with a top quality elementary school as well as offering children a quality public education at Blue Ribbon middle school.

From **Sonya Brown**, PTO President:

The commitment of the Baltimore City Public School System is to provide an appropriate learning environment and quality education for all students. As most of you are aware, last year Carmen Russo, BCPSS CEO, made the bold move of proposing 17 elementary schools for expansion to pre-Kindergarten through grade eight learning environments. The Mt. Washington School was among those proposed for expansion; however, our expansion was contingent upon the approval of capital improvement funds from the State of Maryland for building construction.

The State of Maryland has significantly reduced the amount of money available for capital improvement projects. As a result, the proposed project for The Mt. Washington School was not approved. Because there is inadequate space to house middle grades within the existing building, effective in 2003-2004 school year, the school will revert back to its Kindergarten through grade five status. Additionally, on the recommendation of the Blue Ribbon II Rezoning Task Force, and the endorsement of the Mt. Washington School Improvement Team, Roland Park Elementary/Middle will become the zoned middle school for the students of the Mt. Washington School.

It is both my goal as PTO President and the goal of our school's administration to see that the Mt. Washington School receives the necessary support to make it the best K-5 environment possible in the upcoming school year.

From **George Lewis**, Chairperson of the School Improvement Team.

As most are aware, the School Improvement Team of The Mt. Washington School, along with Baltimore City Public School System (BCPSS), has been working on plans to expand our school from a K-5 program to a PreK-8 community school. This recent effort is the culmination of many years of discussions and requests of the Mt. Washington community of BCPSS and the state to provide a strong PreK-8 community school.

Unfortunately, this year, the State of Maryland has significantly reduced the amount of money available for capital

improvement projects. In this current year it has been reported that there was approximately \$300 million worth of construction projects requested by local school administrations and at the time of this writing it is expected that only \$75 million worth of projects will actually be funded.

Our current school is only structured to accommodate Kindergarten through 5<sup>th</sup> grade. Without the funding commitment of the State of Maryland of our proposed expansion, it will be impossible to continue our plans for a PreK-8 school. BCPSS has informed us that The Mt. Washington School will revert back to a K-5 school, beginning the 2003-2004 school year. On the recommendation of the BCPSS' Blue Ribbon II Rezoning Task Force and the endorsement of the School Improvement Team, Roland Park Elementary/Middle School will become the zoned middle school for the students of The Mt. Washington School beginning the 2003-2004 school year.

Over the next several months the School Improvement Team and the administrative leaders of The Mt. Washington School and Roland Park Elementary/Middle School will be working on the transition details for this move. The School Improvement Team of TMWS feel that these latest rezoning plans provide our children a wonderful opportunity to access the educational programs of a Blue Ribbon School, Roland Park. At Roland Park our children will have the opportunity to participate in either the general education, advanced academics or the Ingenuity Project.

We thank the administration of BCPSS for working with the SIT to provide a positive learning opportunity for our children. We also want to thank Ms. Mariale Hardiman, principal of Roland Park Elementary/Middle School for welcoming us to Roland Park. We look forward to a very positive experience and will continue our efforts to improve the learning environment at The Mt. Washington School.

I found comfort in having someone else rambling around my house - which otherwise seemed too quiet.

The truth is that it is as important as ever. It's important to have a continual presence on our streets. Just as people who walk or carry a purse in a manner that exposes them as an "easy target", neighborhoods can be perceived as "easy targets" as well. It is our responsibility to be sure that we are vigilant, that criminals know we care and their activities will be reported, and that we stay organized to keep our neighborhood safe.

Driving Citizens' Patrol is easy and only takes about 2 + hours every several months. Maybe you've driven before and have not been contacted in a while. Maybe we've called but you've looked at your caller I.D. and decided that you didn't want to take the call at that moment. Maybe Tracey left a message for you and you just haven't gotten around to calling back. Maybe this is the first you've heard about Citizens' Patrol and you'd be more than happy to drive because you would be serving yourself, your family and your neighborhood but you just don't know enough about it. Any and all of these things could be why you're not signed up to drive in the next 2 months.

It involves finding a partner (or we can assign you one), driving around the beautiful streets of Mt. Washington with our very cool lighted sign for 2 hours on a day or evening of your choice, and keeping your eyes out for any suspicious activity. 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## **BRRRR!**

We've already been chilled by early cold weather - and forecasts call for a much colder, wetter winter than we had last year. Pipes and utility meters can freeze if the temperature hovers below 25 degrees for a prolonged time. Here are some tips, compliments of the Baltimore City Department of Public Works, to help protect pipes and water lines this winter:

- Let a thin stream of cold water run from a basement faucet. The stream should be a continuous flow, about the thickness of a pencil. This water can be caught in a bucket to be recycled later as laundry or dish water.
- If your pipe is frozen, gently warm it with hot air from a blow dryer at the point where it enters your house.
- Be sure you know the location of the water shut-off valve in your home.
- Periodically monitor your sump pump. A frozen drain pipe could result in a flooded basement.
- Insulate pipes in unheated parts of your house.
- Be especially alert if you have had frozen pipes in the past.
- Keep bottled water on hand.

The Department of Public Works maintains outdoor water lines up to and including the meter. Water lines running from the meter to the house, as well as internal plumbing, are the responsibility of the property owner. For water emergencies, call 311.

**\* Blue Bag:** Rinse bottles and cans, and discard caps. Place in blue plastic bags. Can include: glass jars and bottles (all colors), aluminum cans, tin cans, steel cans, plastic small mouth containers with #1 or #2, and empty aerosol cans. Styrofoam is not recyclable.

Log on to [www.baltimorecity.gov](http://www.baltimorecity.gov), click on "City Services," then onto "Who You Gonna Call?," then click onto "Online Bulk Trash Service Request Form." You will find an electronic form which asks for your name, telephone number, street address, e-mail address and items you want picked up. DPW will confirm your request via e-mail.

**Reminders:** You may leave three items at your regular trash pick-up site. Bulk items include appliances, furniture, and up to 4 tires with the rims removed. Do not leave building materials such as sheet rock, siding, wood pieces, or roofing out for bulk pick-up.
